

16. EDUCATION

The Bureau of the Census, in its decennial censuses, provides data on the educational attainment of the population. The first data were percentages of the illiterate population and number of children attending school. Beginning in 1950, data became available concerning school attendance and number of years of school completed, by sex and race. Beginning in 1990, educational attainment refers to highest grade "completed" rather than "attended;" therefore, current education data are not comparable to data collected before 1990. The 1990 and 2000 Censuses also provide information on educational degrees earned.

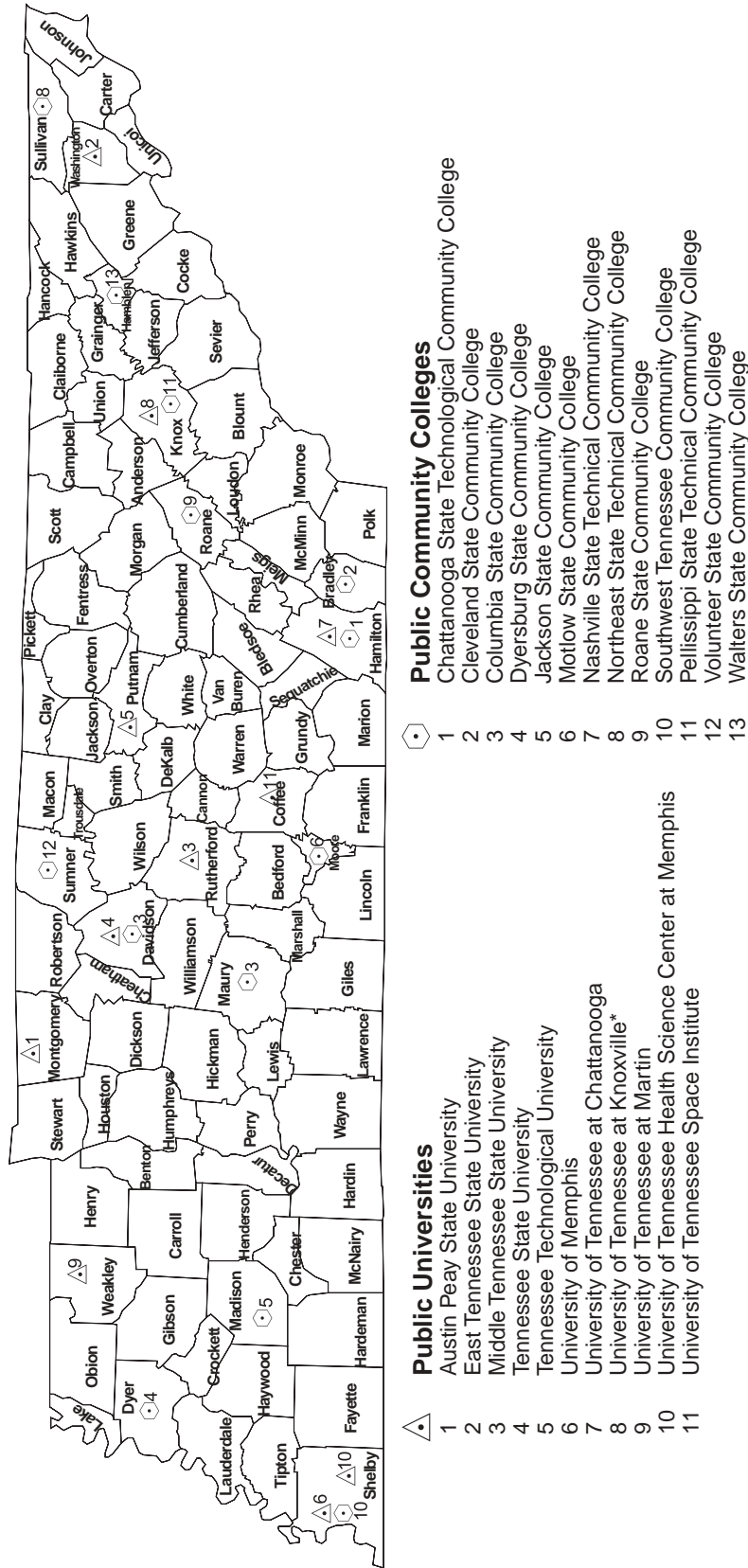

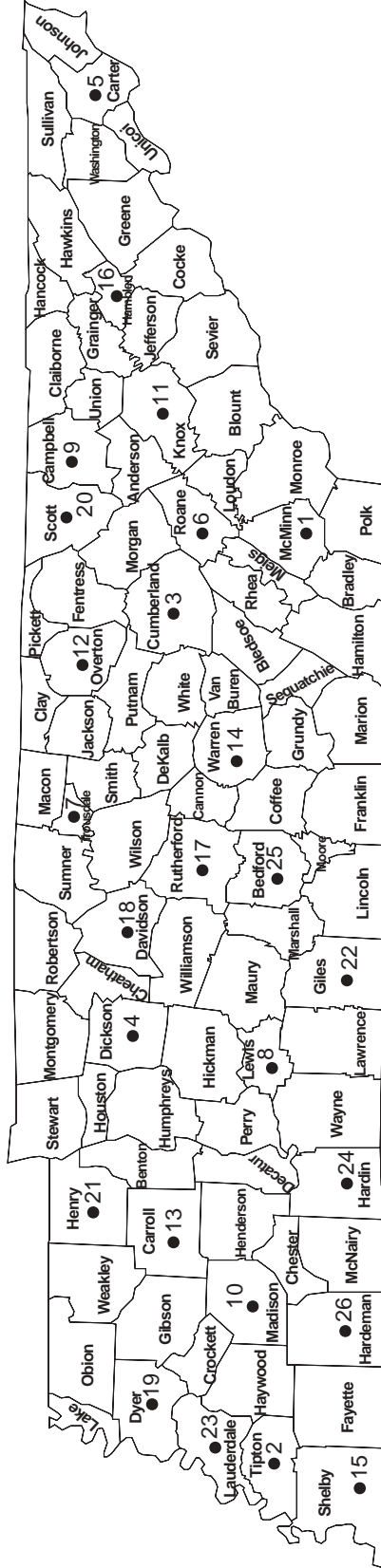

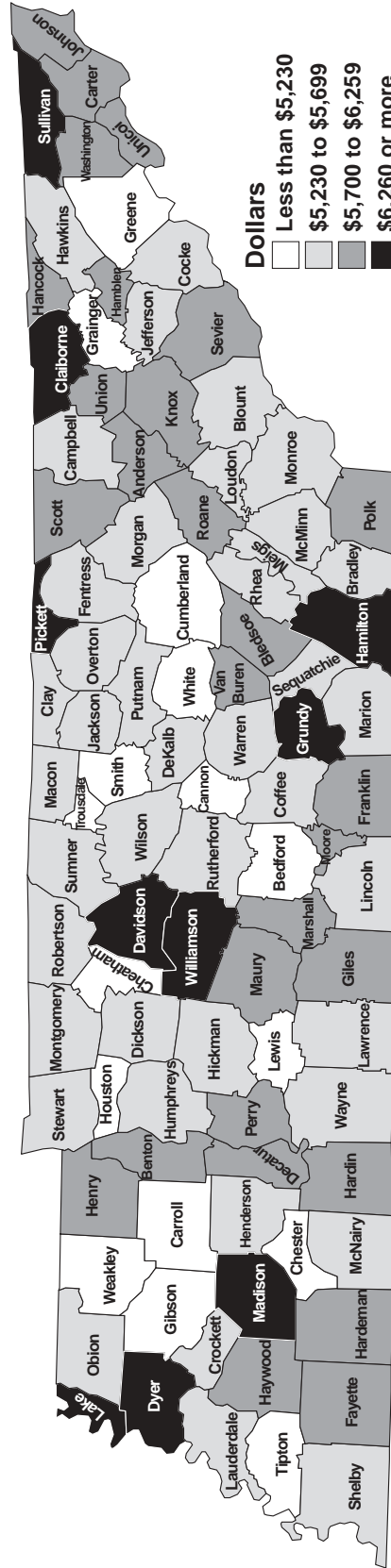
